2024 Achievements

2024 was a busy year for QVSD as we continued to upgrade our aged system to provide safe wastewater treatment to our customers. Some of the projects we completed include:

- Sediment removal from treatment tanks 2, 3, and 4 in preparation for the demolition of the deteriorated concrete lid on tank 4.
- Cleaning of tanks 2, 3, and 4 by Degan Construction, followed by the application of an epoxy coating to the tank surfaces and the pouring of a new concrete lid for tank 4.
- Replacement of the old gasoline pump with a new automated electric pump for better control of system sludge wasting.
- Updating our sludge bagging system with new pumps, controls, and mixing chemicals for faster and more complete removal of waste sludge.
- Rehabilitation of our irrigation system for faster and more efficient treated effluent disposal.
- Enlargement of Logon 2 and addition of new air bubblers, providing much more effluent holding capacity.

IT'S A TOILET, NOT A TRASHCAN!

Remember, you are responsible for the sewer line from your house to our main. You need to check and maintain it regularly.

- Just because an item is labeled "flushable" does not mean it should go down the drain.
- Many "flushable" items do not break down when flushed.
- These unwanted items hinder a toilet's flow, eventually leading to sewer blockages that can cause backups or overflow.
- Be kind to your Sewer and watch what you flush.

To prevent blockages, please refrain from dumping the following items down your toilet, sink, drainpipe, or garbage disposal:

- sanitizers
- chlorine
- prescription and over-the-counter medications
- tampons, mini or maxi pads
- cotton balls and swabs.
- disposable diapers
- condoms
- cleaning wipes of any kind, including personal wipes, baby wipes, tucks
- facial tissue
- paper towels
- Bandages and bandage wrappings
- needles and sharps
- fats, oil or grease from cooking, cars, or lawnmowers
- coffee grounds
- eggshells
- Flushable cat litter
